## MIZRACHI SUGGESTS CAUTION IN RED HUNTS

ATLANTIC CITY, Nov. 8—The Mizrachi Organization of America cold Congressional investigating committees today to avoid "wounding or humiliating man made in the image of God" or face condemnation by religious opinion.

Eight hundred delegator representing 70,000 religious Zionists in his country, took this position in a resolution adopted at the closing session here at the group's thirty-hird annual convention.

The resolution said the organization did not "question the urgent, need of relentless exposure of the Kremlin's agents," but it recomnended caution in the search for subversives.

Another resolution expressed the lelegates' "grief and despain at ack of rederal action to revise or replace the existing lumigration policy of the United States as empedied in the McCarran-Wilter Act, which has been indicted by very fair-minded authority as discriminatory and exclusionist in its surpose and effect."

Referring to relations between srael and the United States, the lelegates asserted in a resolution hat the Near East problem could' a solved only if it was made clear hat the United States and the Inited Nations "are not bent on a unitive expedition" in the debate cheduled to be resumed soon in he Security Council on border tentions.
