

# ZIONISTS PROJECT \$5,000,000 OUTLAY

Religious Unit Maps 5-Year  
Program to Bind Jews of  
America and Israel

ATLANTIC CITY, Nov. 23—

A program calling for the expenditure of \$5,000,000 in the next five years on religious Zionist projects in this country and Israel was outlined here today.

It was submitted to the 800 delegates attending the final session of the annual meeting of the Religious Zionists of America.

As presented in a report by the Rev. Isaac Rose, executive director of the group, and Samuel Spar, executive secretary, the program and budget are expected to be approved by the organization's executive body at a meeting in New York soon.

In their report Rabbi Rose and Mr. Spar declared that the principal goal of the Religious Zionists of America was "to create a religious bridge between Israel, the only democracy in the Middle East, and the United States."

They recommended providing scholarships in an exchange program for American Jewish youths to study in Israel and for Israeli students to come here. They also proposed establishing four summer camps in this country to train youth leaders and offer adult education as well.

In Israel the program calls for five more religious youth centers, three additional trade schools and two agricultural schools. The organization maintains a network of such institutions in Israel.

The delegates adopted a series of resolutions dealing with foreign and domestic issues, including an appeal to the Soviet Union to grant "full and complete religious liberty and unrestricted cultural freedom to its three million Jewish citizens."

Another resolution called for intensified support by American Jewish communities of fundraising activities on behalf of Israel by the United Jewish Appeal, the Israel Bond Organization and the Jewish National Fund of America.

The delegates also went on record as appealing to various states to enact "fair Sabbath measures so as to relieve the hardships caused to thousands of Jewish Sabbath-observing merchants and business men."

The delegates re-elected the Rev. Dr. Isaac Stollman of Detroit as president and the Rev. Dr. Joseph B. Soloveitchik of Boston as honorary president. Re-elected as honorary chair-

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Samson Krupnick of Chicago was re-elected chairman of the executive board. Named as members of the newly created Board of Governors were Charles Bick, Max Hagler, Dr. Samuel L. Sar and Mendel Siegman, all of New York.
