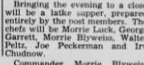

Name Bob Hope as National Chairman of NCCJ Brotherhod Week

Bob Hope, star of radio, television and motion pictures, has been named national chairman of Brotherhood Week to be observed next Feb. 18-26 under the sponsorship of the National Center of Christians and Jews. He was announced by Dr. Lewis Webster Jones, president of the organization.

Since his first observance in 1954, Brotherhood Week is celebrated each year during the week of George Washington's birthday as a period of rededication "to the ideals of our Judeo-Christian heritage and the democratic values upon which our nation was founded," Dr. Jones said.

Previous chairmen of Brotherhood Week have included Nelson A. Rockefeller, Eric Johnston, Roger W. Straus, Ben Duffy, Harry S. Friedman, J. Zach B. Selzer and Cornelia Otis Skinner.

Dr. Jones hailed Mr. Hope as "America's entertainment ambassador of good will" and lauded his efforts in creating better understanding among the religious and racial groups of the nation.

He received his doctor's degree from Boston University, where he also served on the faculty. He previously was executive director of The Boston Jewish Vocational Service and Work Adjustment Center.

Dr. Feingold has received citations from Hays National Lodge B'nai B'rith and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Division of the Blind. He serves on the President's Committee on the Employment of the Physically Handicapped, and is an several national scholarship committees.

He is a Fellow of the American Psychological Assn., as well as holding professional memberships in the National Vocational Guidance Association. He served as an officer-psychologist in World War II and is listed in "Who's Who in the Southwest," "Leaders in American Science," and "Who's Who in American Education."

Dr. Feingold will meet with both B'nai B'rith and Jewish Vocational Service officers and committee members. He will also address a meeting of greater Milwaukee

Jewess Defeats Five Men; Wins Seat in Legislature

MINNEAPOLIS — (JTA) — A 48-year-old Brooklyn-born woman, the only Jewess in her county, stood on every doorstep in Minnesota's 6th district to win a seat in the state Legislature.

Mrs. Esther Feldman won in her first bid for public office, succeeding where her husband, Max Feldman, a merchant, failed two years ago. She defeated five men in the primary and general elections.

A Tamiami Park student in Brooklyn, Mrs. Feldman kept Jewish ritual in her home which has plenty of Jewish books and records. The Feldmans have four children.
